Spring Clean Up

The annual Spring Clean-up is scheduled for June 5-9. YOUR SPRING CLEAN UP DAY IS THE SAME DAY AS YOUR TRASH PICK UP. For example, if your trash is picked up on a Monday, your Spring Clean Up day will be Monday, June 5; if your trash is picked up on a Tuesday, your Spring Clean Up day will be Tuesday, your Spring Clean Up day will be Tuesday, June 6. To assure pickup, all items must be placed at the FRONT CURB by 8 a.m. on the scheduled day.

AFTER THE TRUCK HAS BEEN IN YOUR AREA, IT WILL NOT RETURN. If we fall behind schedule we will continue where we left off the following day.

Bulk Items that WILL be picked up include:

Furniture: dressers, tables, bookshelves, desks, headboards, etc, mattress sets, large carpets (cut into manageable bundles no longer than 4 ft.), bulky items

that don't fit in your garbage can (must be contained), appliances, glass portions of doors, windows, etc. NOTE: These must be broken and placed into small box marked "glass". Please also remove nails/ staples or anything sharp that is exposed to prevent injury to you and the collector.

Bulk Items that WILL NOT be picked up include:

Construction debris: concrete, shingles, loose trash or trash in cardboard boxes, tires, lead/oil based paint, varnish, batteries, yard waste, fluorescent light bulbs, any other items not listed identified as hazardous waste, electronic waste – due to Illinois State Law, electronics cannot be disposed of in a landfill and therefore cannot be placed at the curb for pickup. This includes televisions, computer monitors/accessories, DVD/VCR players, as well as several other items.

For a complete list of banned items, and where to properly dispose of these items, contact Republic Services.

Consideration of bags/containers being less than 50 lbs. in weight is appreciated. If you have a question regarding a bulk item you want to dispose of, simply contact the Republic Services' Customer Resource Team at 656-6883 or republic-services.com and they will advise you on the best disposal method.

** SPECIAL PICKUPS **

Each Wednesday, Republic Services will pick up bulky items in front of your house for \$35 per pick-up truck load. You may make arrangements for this special pickup at your home by calling 656-6883.

Notes From The General Inspector

Wood River Property Owners/Occupants

All City of Wood River property owners and occupants of real estate are hereby notified by this notice of the City's weed control ordinance and enforcement. It shall be unlawful for any owner or occupant of any lot of ground or premises to allow such lot or premises or any right-of-way or sidewalk adjoining such lot or premises, to be encumbered by any growth of grass or weeds over a height of eight inches.

Whenever any owner or occupant of real estate neglects to cut weeds or grass, as defined above, the weeds or grass may be cut by the City. The property owner will be billed for all expenses involved in having the weeds or grass cut. If the property owner fails to pay the billed expenses within 30 days, a lien may be filed pursuant to ILCS Ch. 65, Art. 5 § 11-20-7.

Please help by properly maintaining your property.



Keep it Short

Clean up Alleys - We receive many complaints about trash in alleys. City Code states that all trash must be placed in a watertight container of a solid and durable grade of metal or fire resistant plastic with a tightly fitted cover. So please help keep the alleys clean by placing your trash in tightly covered containers.

Vehicles - parked on public and/or private property MUST be licensed and operable. If a vehicle does not comply, the City can have the vehicle towed at the owner's expense.

Parking in residential districts shall not be located in any required front yard, except in a driveway. Parking may be located in the side or rear yards as well.

Recreational vehicles and utility trailers in Residential Districts shall comply with the following guidelines:

- Not more than one recreational vehicle or utility trailer on any lot.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer is allowed in the rear yard only.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall comply with the yard requirements for accessory buildings.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall not impede the light or air of a neighboring structure.

All of the above matters are Code violations and carry a fine of up to \$500/day.


Despite the numerous changes, WRFD will maintain our focus on providing the highest level of service possible to the residents of Wood River. In 2016, members of our department responded to 1,549 emergencies, logged over 1,300 hours of training and used Advanced Life Support skills 466 times in the field. Inspections, prevention and education of the public will continue to be an essential function of our personnel. In 2016, we had contact with approximately 3,000 young people in our community educating them on topics from fire and home safety to heroin prevention. The Wood River Fire Department is pleased to announce its partnership with the American Red Cross, Home Fire Campaign and Disaster Preparedness. The majority of injuries and deaths related to residential fires are a result of missing, improperly placed, aged, or non-functioning detectors. The partnership with American Red Cross allows fire personnel to install up to three smoke detectors per household, for those in need. ZAC BLASIOLI as the 2017 Illinois State 1A Wrestling Champion in the 132 pound weight class. Zac had a truly historic wrestling career at East Alton Wood River Community High School. He is the first Oiler to place three times at state with a 2nd place finish in 2016 and 6th place in 2014. In addition to this year's championship. His record as a senior was 39-1 with a career mark of 147-23. Zac was a state qualifier all four years after winning four regional titles and one sectional championship. He also won four tournament titles at Mount Olive, three at Rochester and one at Civic Memorial.

DREW SOBOL as an All-State golfer. Drew holds East Alton Wood River Community High School record for lowest 18hole score, a 5-under par 67 at the Battle for the Hickory Stick Tourney at Belk Park Golf Course and the lowest 9-hole score of 32. He was first place medalist 37 times in his career, smashing the previous Oilers record of 18. Drew is the first Oiler to qualify twice for the IHSA State golf tourney. In October 2016, he advanced to state as an individual by being among the top ten golfers in the regional and sectional tournaments. Drew was Madison County 1st place medalist, three times All-Madison County, and twice Prairie State Conference 1st Place Medalist.

DREW SOBOL for his outstanding accomplishments as a wrestler at East Alton Wood River Community High School. He qualified all four years for the IHSA state tournament was a 4th place medalist in both 2016 and 2017. Drew's career

record was 150-19 and he holds Oiler records with 116 falls, most wins in a season with 44 and three-time sectional champion. He was a four-time regional champ and won four tournament titles at Mount Olive, three at Rochester and one each at Civic Memorial and Mascoutah.

ZACH GOLENOR for joining the rare 1,000 Point Club for Roxana Shells Basketball. That impressive feat was just the start as Zach finished his career with 1,427 points, the second highest total in the more than 75-year history of the Shells. He also set the all-time RHS career record for most games played. The Advantage News recognized Zach's all-around skills by selecting him as The Athlete of the Week in December 2016.



MIKE YOUNG for capturing four medals at the Masters and Open Indoor Track and Field Championships in Champaign and four medals at the USATF Wisconsin Open/Masters Track and Field Championships. Mike's recent efforts in the 60 and 55-meters sprint events were fast enough to qualify him for All-American status. He then entered the USA Track and Field Masters Indoor National Championships and became a national champion gold medalist in the 4x200 relay.



KEITH TITE, owner of Wood River Hardware and all employees for their loyal and dedicated service to the citizens of Wood River. Wood River Hardware, originally owned by the Soliday family, opened in 1920. In the 1960s, Billy Joe Tite purchased the Hardware store and Keith became only the third owner in 1995. Keith and his family have spent countless hours of community service with their involvement with Wood River Lions Club and Wood River Downtown Development Taxing District. We wish him the best of luck with his retirement.
