CAUTION: Street Improvements Ahead

Parking at Emerick Sports Complex will be affected

Public Works has begun the 6th Street Upgrade Project and it is composed of three main segments: South, Middle and North.

The south segment will extend from Edwardsville Road to Park Lane. This section's improvements will consist of grading, milling and resurfacing. Sidewalk curb ramps will also be upgraded at side street intersections. A storm sewer system will be installed and will outlet to the existing basin at the middle segment. The middle segment will extend from Park Lane to just north of Pershing Ave. This section will also see curb, guttering and sidewalk upgrades. The north segment will extend up to the curve at Woodland Cemetery and will be resurfaced along with culvert replacement and ditch work as needed. Please be aware there will be traffic restrictions during construction and plan accordingly to use alternate routes.

For those utilizing Emerick Sports Complex, we apologize for any parking inconvenience these upgrades may cause. We appreciate your patience as we work to improve your City streets.


Storage of Trash/Recycling Containers

City Code states waste and recycling containers are to be placed beside or behind the residence within 24 hours after the scheduled collection day.

All refuse and recycling materials must be completely enclosed within the confines of the waste/recycling containers with the lid closed. Nothing put around or alongside of the **Republic** containers will be collected. Nothing put in a **non Republic** container will be picked up. Only trash or recycling that is put completely inside the proper **Republic** container will be picked up. If your old garbage containers are not needed, they need to be properly disposed of.

Please note if you do not plan to recycle. YOU will need to call Republic Services at 656-6883 to come to your house and pick up the Recycling Container that they provided. Thank you for your cooperation in this matter, it is appreciated.

Personalized On Demand "Big Trash"

City-wide Spring and Fall Trash Pickups have been replaced by Personalized-On-Demand Twice-A-Year-Pickups. That's right! YOU call and schedule YOUR pickups on YOUR schedule, when YOU are ready! No missing the date.

The only changes with the Personalized-On-Demand Cleanups compared to the City-Wide Cleanups are the resident gets to choose the date and the resident must schedule the cleanup with Republic Services Customer Service Representatives.

Guidelines for Personal-On-Demand Cleanups:

- Beginning January 2, 2018, each household will have up to two (2) Personalized-On-Demand Cleanups per calendar year, at no cost.
- Personalized cleanups must be pre-scheduled by calling customer service at 618-656-6883.
- Customer service will provide the date to set the items out curbside. The date provided to resident will be within seven days of the call in.
- All items must be placed curbside.
- All small items must be contained.
- All nails/staples or anything sharp that is exposed must be removed.

- Bagged item piles must not exceed an area of 4' x 4' x 4'.
- Bags may not exceed 50 lbs each.

Acceptable items included in personalized cleanups:

- Appliances.
- Carpet: cut into bundles no longer than 4' in length and 3" in diameter. Carpet bundles can weigh no more than 50 lbs. per bundle.
- Household furniture: couch, chair, dressers, tables, desk, etc.
- Glass portions of doors/windows: must be broken and placed into small box marked "glass."
- Mattresses.

Items not accepted with personalized cleanups

- Basketball insert/poles, unless broken down into 4' sections and no larger than 3" in diameter.
- Batteries.
- Concrete.
- Construction materials of any kind.
- Electronic waste.
- Fluorescent light bulbs.
- Lead/oil based paint, varnish.
- Loose trash or trash in cardboard boxes.
- Tires.
- Yard waste.

Notes From the General Inspector

Clean up Alleys - City ordinance states it shall be unlawful for any owner or occupant of any premises to allow such premises or any right-of-way or sidewalk adjoining such premises, to be encumbered by any growth of grass, weeds or bushes over a height of 8" inches. Please remember to maintain your alley right-of-way, especially if you have a fence.

Keep it Short – Grass and weeds must be kept under 8" to comply with City ordinance. Let's help each other. If the City has to send you a letter and has to cut your grass, it ends up costing you a lot more than having it done yourself.

Vehicles parked on public and/or private property **MUST** be licensed and operable. If a vehicle does not comply, the City can have the vehicle towed at the owner's expense.

Parking in residential districts shall not be located in any required front yard, except in a driveway. Parking may be located in the side or rear yards as well.

Recreational vehicles and utility trailers in residential districts shall comply with the following guidelines:


- Not more than one recreational vehicle or utility trailer on any lot.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer is allowed in the rear yard only.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall comply with the yard requirements for accessory buildings.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall not impede the light or air of a neighboring structure.

All of the above matters are Code violations and carry a fine of up to \$500/day.




Wells Promoted to Chief




Water Department News

Fire Department News

Can I burn my Leaves? Spring is upon us and our residents will be eager to get outside and spruce up their properties. The Wood River Fire Department would like to remind all citizens that the city provides an environmentally friendly alternative to dispose of yard waste rather than burning it. The city waste disposal facility located at 400 Smith Ct. in the EnviroTech Park will accept yard waste (grass and leaves) during the following hours of operation: Monday, Friday, and Saturday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and Sunday from noon to 4 p.m. If you so choose to burn your yard waste, please be aware that the City of Wood River has a burning ordinance that somewhat limits this activity. By ordinance, outdoor burning of leaves, plants, shrubs, and small limbs is allowed on private property only. This activity can be conducted on Wednesday and Saturday during the time period of October 1 through April 30 of each year. This activity should take place within daylight hours, only during calm weather with winds less than 10 MPH and not within 15 feet of any structure. All burning will need to

be supervised with water hose or other means readily available to extinguish the fire if needed. No leaf burning shall be permitted on any public street at any time.

As always, if you observe a fire that is not under immediate supervision or out of control please call 911 and report this activity immediately. We truly appreciate our residents keeping our neighborhoods looking great and with a few precautions you may even alleviate the fire department showing up unexpectedly.

Smoke Detectors Save Lives

The fire department is pleased to announce its partnership with the American Red Cross, Home Fire Campaign and Disaster Preparedness. The Home Fire Campaign efforts are to reduce fire deaths and injuries nationwide 25% by 2019. The majority of injuries and deaths related to residential fires are a result of missing, improperly placed, aged, or non-functioning detectors. The partnership allows fire personnel to install up to three smoke detectors per household, for those in need. For detectors and a complete home fire safety inspection please call 259-0984.

Youth Programs

SUMMER DAY CAMP: The Recreation Department will once again host a summer day camp for children kindergarten through 5th grade on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m.-2 p.m., June 4 thru July 13 at the Roundhouse. PRE-REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED IN PERSON. A limit of 50 children will be accepted. Registration deadline is June 1 or 50 campers. Cost: residents-\$150 per child non-resident-\$170 per child. * \$10 will be taken off the price of each additional child registered by parent or guardian*

FISHING CLINIC: A FREE fishing clinic will be offered this summer at Belk Park the week of June 25 from 9-11 a.m. & an afternoon session 1-3 p.m. This is a free clinic for all ages. Registration is required to participate and runs from May 1-31. Class size is limited to 30 participants.

CHEERLEADING CAMP: Be a cheer ahead of the game. A cheerleading camp will be offered July 16-20, from 12-2 p.m. at the Roundhouse. This camp will involve sideline cheers, a floor cheer and assistance with mounts. Fourth through eighth grade students are invited. Registration runs May 1-31 and the fee is \$25.

JR. CHEERLEADING CAMP: Come learn your favorite cheer. K-3rd grade students are invited to attend a cheerleading camp where they will be introduced to the fun of cheerleading. The camp will be held July 16-20 from 9-11 a.m. at the Roundhouse. Registration runs May 1-31 and the fee is \$25.

Adult Programs

2018 FALL SOFTBALL: Registration begins in June and the deadline is August 10. All leagues begin play during the first week of September.

Alcoholics Anonymous: Regular meetings are held at the 14th Street Shelter on Sundays from 10 a.m. to noon. Meetings are an excellent place to gain support, obtain helpful information about drinking problems or seek help for drinking problems. Everyone is welcome.

Hoedowners Square Dancers: The Wood River Square Dance Club was started by Mayor Lucien Ringering in 1949. The Hoedowners is the oldest square dance club in existence in Illinois and has always danced in the Roundhouse. Square dancing provides good physical exercise as well as enjoyment for the mind, body and soul, for all ages. Social interaction with other people is an added bonus and it is pure enjoyment set to music. A new class will begin in September and is held for two hours each Thursday at 7 p.m. Once you have completed lessons, you may be interested in joining the Hoedowners on the 2nd & 4th Saturdays of each month at 7 p.m. in the Roundhouse. Occasionally they invite other clubs and guest callers. The first week's class is free.

SENIOR ADULT PROGRAM 55+ invites any adult, age 55 and over, to join in activities for an annual fee of \$10. Meetings are held at 11 a.m. on the second Thursday of every month at the Roundhouse. After a brief meeting a full meal is served and catered by Chef Bob. The cost per meal is \$5. After paying the annual fee of \$10, each member is entitled to four meals without paying (Mother's Day (May), Father's Day (June), Thanksgiving (Nov.), and Christmas (Dec)). After the meal is served bingo is played with each winner awarded \$2. The cost of the bingo is funded by a 50-50 drawing. The meal and the bingo usually ends about 1:30 p.m.

APPEARANCE AWARDS

The Appearance Board will be driving around town looking for residences and businesses that have made overall improvements. Deposits on Streets and Sidewalks

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to dump or deposit any grass, leaves, branches, gumballs, glass, nails or other similar articles, or any waste material on any public street, alley, or sidewalk in the City.

Storm Clean-Up

Following a storm, the Street Department will haul away branches that have fallen. Please place the branches at the front curb and contact the Public Services Office at 251-3122.

Solicitors

City ordinance regulates peddlers and solicitors in residential neighborhoods. Individuals going door-to-door are required to have a City license. Before a license is issued, the Police Department runs a background check on each individual for the safety and welfare of residents. Ask solicitors to see a city license. If there is no license or if the solicitor is acting in an undesirable manner, contact the police at 251-3114. Please remember a city license is in no way an endorsement of the firm or product. Established religious and charitable not-for-profit organizations are exempt from these regulations.

YARD & GARAGE SALES

Along with the warm weather comes yard/garage sales. Don't forget to get your yard/garage sale permit. They are FREE and can be obtained at the City Clerk's office Monday-Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Yard/garage sales are allowed two times a year with a duration not to exceed seventy-two (72) continuous hours. City code prohibits the placement of signs or advertising on utility poles, traffic control devices or anywhere in the public right-of-way. We appreciate your cooperation and good luck with your sale.
