The public works department will also continue to oil and chip alleys in zone seven and zone eight this year. These two zones include “Little Italy” and streets west of Wood River Ave.

Project Updates

COMPLETED 6th Street Resurfacing Phase 2—resurfaced 6th Street from Edwardsville Road to State Route 143. All intersections were upgraded to handicap accessibility and the road was striped.

COMPLETED Streetscape Phase 2—still awaiting installation of the sign “Historic Downtown Wood River”

Wood River Avenue Phase 1 and 2—This is a rotomill and resurfacing project on Wood River Avenue from East Alton City limits to Ferguson Avenue. All intersections will be upgraded to handicap accessibility and there will be new striping for this length of road. The project is under design and is tentatively set to bid June of 2022. The current construction cost estimate is \$1,000,000 and are covered 75% by the State and 25% by the County with construction to begin August 2022.

State St. Waterline Phase 1—project will install a new 12” water main on State St between Harnett and Elble. The City is applying for a \$100,000 grant from Madison County Community Development. Project construction cost is estimated at \$300,000 covered 33% by the County and 67% by the City with construction beginning this spring.

State St. Waterline Phase 2—project will continue the new 12” water main on State St and will run from Elble to Cotter and then continue to Haller. Project construction cost is approximately \$100,000 and expected to begin October 2022.

Manhole Lining Phase 3 & 4—projects will line approximately 150 manholes that are in desperate need of rehabilitation. The lining will re-establish structural stability within the manhole and stop them from leaking. Most of these manholes are brick and well over 80 years of age. Construction cost is approximately \$300,000 and begins this spring.

Trash and Recycle

City Code states: Waste and Recycling containers are to be placed beside or behind the residence within 24 hours after the scheduled collection day.

Personalized on Demand “Big Trash” Pickups

City-wide Spring and Fall Trash Pickups were replaced by Personalized-On-Demand Twice-A-Year-Pickups. YOU call and schedule YOUR pickups on YOUR schedule when YOU are ready! Each household gets two FREE pick-ups per calendar year. You must pre-schedule by calling customer service at 618-656-6883.

Holiday Schedule for Trash/Recycling Pickup

Holidays observed: New Year’s Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day, Thanksgiving & Christmas Day

If the holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, there is no disruption in the pickup schedule. Should your pickup day fall on or after the holiday, your trash and/or recyclables will be collected one day late. For example: Holiday falls on a Monday, then: Monday route is picked up Tuesday, Tuesday route is picked up Wednesday, Wednesday route is picked up Thursday, Thursday route is picked up Friday, Friday route is picked up Saturday.

Lawn and Brush Clean Up

Deposits on Streets and Sidewalks: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to dump or deposit any grass, leaves, branches, gumballs, glass, nails or other similar articles, or any waste material on any public street, alley, or sidewalk in the City.

Storm Clean-Up: Following a storm, the Street Department will haul away branches that have fallen. Branches must be placed at the front curb and you must contact the Public Services Office at 251-3122 to report the address.

Regular Brush Pick Up: Residents can schedule for brush/tree limbs to be picked-up curbside for a fee of \$50 per truckload by contacting the Finance Department at 618-251-3131. Pre-payment and scheduling arrangements must be done in advance.

Billing Schedule

Meter Reading: On or about the 26th of the month.

Bills Transmitted: 5th of the month (or the previous business day)

Due Date: 3rd of the following month

Penalty: A 10% penalty is applied if payment is not received in our office by the due date.

Shut Off Notice: The 15th of the month after the bill is transmitted (or \$25 fee added at 8 a.m. the following business day)

Shut Off: The 25th of the month after the bill is transmitted (or \$60 fee added at 8 a.m. the following business day)

Remember: check the message center and the reverse side of your water/sewer bill for important information.

Water bills can be paid in person, online at woodriver.authoritypay.com or over the phone at 855-966-6582. Please see the City website for information at woodriver.org. You can also sign up for direct debit by bringing a voided check to the Water/Finance Department at City Hall.

If you are over the age of 62 or receiving social security, please bring your ID and/or social security award letter to the Water/Finance Department to see if you qualify for a penalty waiver.

Public Notice

Solicitors: City ordinance regulates peddlers and solicitors in residential neighborhoods. Individuals going door-to-door are **REQUIRED** to have a City license. Before a license is issued, the Police Department runs a background check on each individual for the safety and welfare of residents. Ask solicitors to show you their city license. If they have no license or if the solicitor is acting in an undesirable manner, contact the police immediately at 251-3114. Please remember, a city license is in no way an endorsement of the firm or product. Established religious and charitable, not-for-profit organizations are exempt from these regulations.

Yard & Garage Sales: Along with the warm weather comes yard/garage sales. Don't forget to get your **FREE** yard/garage sale permit at City Hall Monday-Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Yard/garage sales are allowed two times a year with a duration not to exceed seventy-two (72) continuous hours. City code prohibits the placement of signs or advertising on utility poles, traffic control devices or anywhere in the public right-of-way. We appreciate your cooperation.

Games Interfering with Traffic—Prohibited: It shall be unlawful to play any games upon any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place where such games cause unnecessary noise or interference with traffic or pedestrians. This is particularly true about basketball hoops and should be limited to driveways only.

Clean up Alleys: City ordinances state it shall be unlawful for any owner or occupant of any premises to allow such premises or any right-of-way or sidewalk adjoining such premises, to be hampered by any growth of grass, weeds or bushes over a height of eight inches. Please remember to maintain your alley right-of-way, especially if you have a fence.

Important Note about Water Meters—DO NOT mow over the top of the radio on your Water Meter. These meters are costly to replace.

**Notes from
Building & Zoning:**

The Building & Zoning Department is working diligently to address blighted properties in the City. If you see a problem area that needs attention, please send an email to zoning@cityofwoodriver.com.

Grass and weeds must be kept under 8" to comply with City ordinance. If the City has to send you a letter and then cuts your grass, it ends up costing you a lot more than having it done yourself.

If you receive a letter for property maintenance violation(s) please **DO NOT** ignore it. Property owners are ultimately responsible for everything that happens on property they own, including the alleyway. Educate your tenants/occupants so a bill and/or court summons does not show up in your mail. If you are a tenant/occupant please mow and weed eat in a timely manner and do not neglect the alleyway, especially if you have a fence.

Vehicles parked on public and/or private property **MUST** be licensed and operable. If a vehicle does not comply, the City may have the vehicle towed at the owner's expense and issue a citation.

Parking in residential districts shall not be in any required front yard, except in a driveway. Parking is allowed in the side or rear yard only.

Recreational vehicles and utility trailers in Residential Districts shall comply with the following guidelines:

- Not more than one recreational vehicle or utility trailer on any lot.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer is allowed in the rear yard only.
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall comply with the yard requirements for accessory buildings
- The parking of a recreational vehicle or utility trailer shall not impede the light or air of a neighboring structure.

All of the above matters are Code violations and carry a fine of up to \$500/day.

Fire Department



Welcome back to **Engineer/Paramedic Kris Ayers and Paid-On-Call Firefighter Julian Blount** from their recent military deployment with US Army Unit EN DET 355 & 736. Thank you for your dedicated service!

Congratulations to newly promoted **Fire Captain Bill Hall**. Captain Hall has been with the fire department since 1989 when he was a Paid On Call Firefighter. He was hired as a Full-Time Firefighter in 1994. Captain Hall is a 2nd generation firefighter with the Wood River Fire Department after following in the footsteps of his father, Ralph Hall.

Smoke Detector Importance

The Fire Department reminds all residents of the importance of having working smoke detectors. Illinois law requires that smoke alarms in dwelling units are listed by an approved third-party testing organization. The Smoke Detector Act (425 ILCS 60) outlines requirements for smoke alarms in dwelling units (one- and two-family homes).

According to the Act, every home or hotel must have at least one approved, operating smoke detector within fifteen feet of every room used for sleeping purposes and one on each floor and/or ceiling of stairwells.

Further, smoke detectors must be installed on the ceiling at least six inches from any walls or may be installed on a wall located between four and six inches from the ceiling.

Fire Chief Recommendations:

- Install the 10-year lithium ion sealed smoke detectors.
- Smoke detectors within 15 feet of rooms used for sleeping purposes.
- Smoke detectors in each room used for sleeping purposes.

- Smoke detector on each floor of occupancy and/or stairwells.
- Smoke detectors cleaned (compressed air) and checked for working operation monthly.
- Smoke detector batteries replaced every six months (if not 10-year lithium ion unit) or during daylight savings time clock adjustments.
- Smoke detectors replaced every eight to 10 years based on manufacturer recommendation. They do expire!
- Carbon monoxide detector in each occupancy. (same testing, cleaning, battery replacement, and overall replacement guidelines).
- Have and PRACTICE a home fire escape plan with your family. Practice twice per year.

The fire department provides Life Safety Inspections for all residents and occupancies in the City. Partnered with the OSFM and Red Cross, we provide smoke detectors to property owners in need or otherwise determined appropriate.


The City of Wood River would like to welcome the newest Patrolmen:




